

# **Mizmar (instrument)**

In <u>Arabic music</u>, a *mizmār* (<u>Arabic</u>: مزمار; plural مَرَامِير; plural <u>mazāmīr</u>) is any single or <u>double reed wind instrument</u>. In <u>Egypt</u>, the term *mizmar* usually refers to the conical <u>shawm</u> that is called *zurna* in Turkey and Armenia.

*Mizmar* is also a term used for a group of musicians, usually a duo or trio, that play a *mizmar* instrument along with an accompaniment of one or two double-sided <u>bass drums</u>, known in Arabic as *tabl baladi* or simply *tabl*.

Mizmars are usually played in Egypt at either <u>weddings</u> or as an accompaniment to <u>belly dancers</u>. At <u>Egyptian weddings</u>, the Mizmar Baldi is accompanied with a belly dancer to greet the bride and groom. [1]

In <u>The Arabian Peninsula</u>, <u>Iraq</u>, <u>Jordan</u>, <u>Lebanon</u>, the <u>Palestinian Territories</u>, and <u>Syria</u>, it is influenced by the <u>Anatolian/Armenian zurna</u>, a higher-pitched version of the *mizmar*, and may also be known in those countries as a *zamr* (زمر) or *zamour*, as well as *mizmar*. In <u>Algeria</u> a similar instrument is called *ghaita* or <u>rhaita</u> (غيطة). [3] Along with belly dancing, the mizmar may accompany the <u>dabke</u>, a folkloric <u>line</u> dance done in Jordan, <u>Lebanon</u>, <u>Syria</u>, <u>Palestine</u>, and Iraq.
